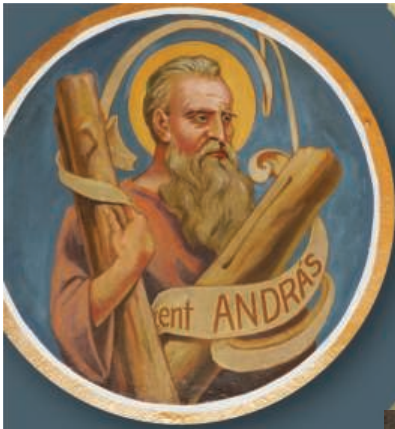

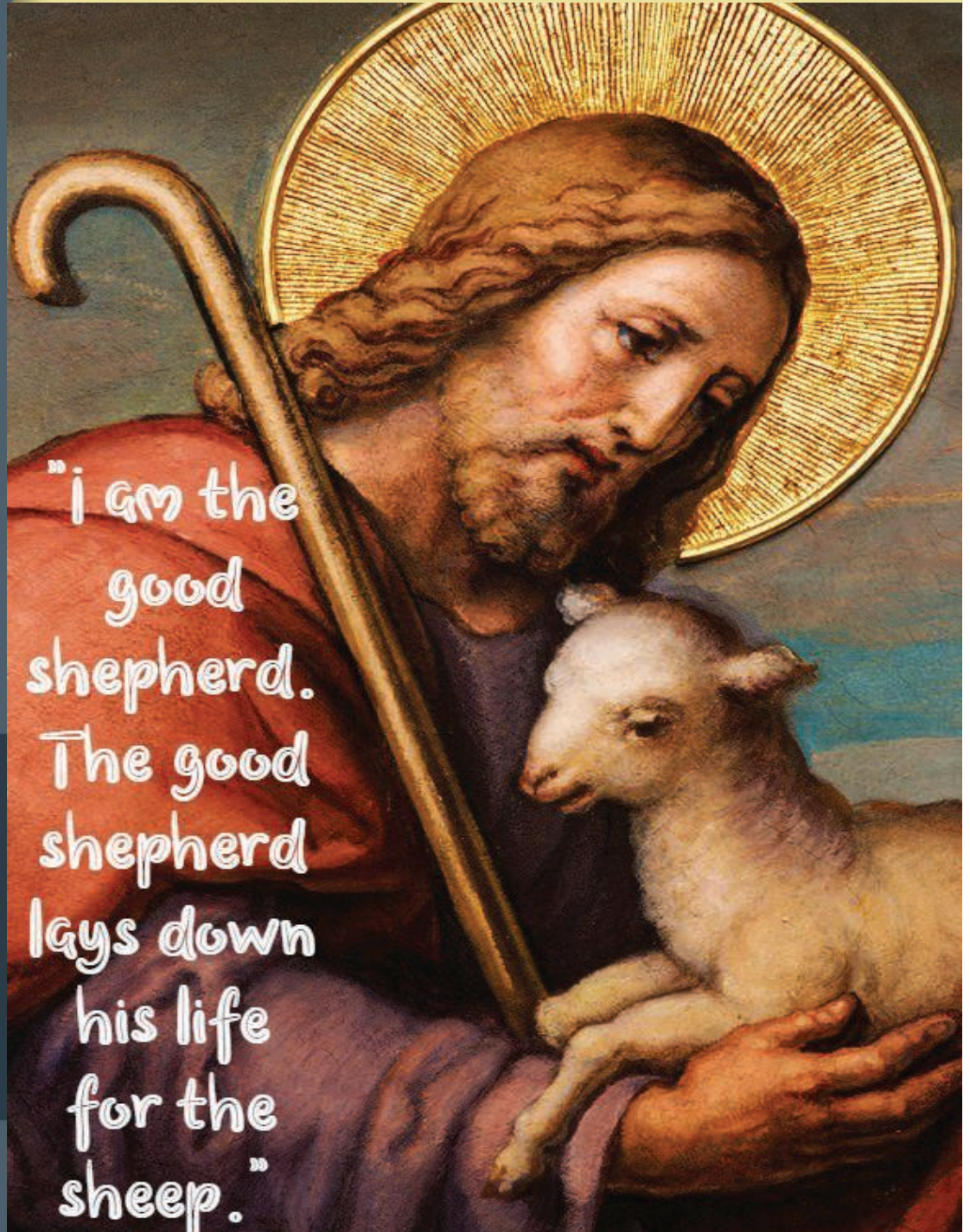

April devotions are addressed to the Eucharist, to the Holy Spirit and to Divine Mercy. The Eucharist symbolizes the sacrifice of Jesus, which is renewed at every Mass. The Eucharist contains in itself all the love of Jesus, in all its forms: crucified, adoring, contemplating, praying, intoxicating. To reserve time and attention to this devotion leads to the attainment of many graces and a sense of closeness to the priceless love of God. Jesus dictated the Chaplet of Divine Mercy to Saint Faustina Kowalska in 1935, promising that whoever recites this prayer would have the certainty of dying in peace and grace, and of letting those who have listened to them die peacefully. This devotion guarantees forgiveness even to the most hardened sinners, showing the immensity of Jesus' mercy.

Sunday, April 21, 2024
The Fourth Sunday of Easter
 Acts 4:8-12 ; 1 Jn 3:1-2 ; Jn 10:11-18



“I hate this gospel,” said a friend of mine from New Zealand, as she broke open the word for the assembly on Good Shepherd Sunday (which this fourth Sunday of Easter is often called), some years ago. Coming from a country that at the time had sixty million sheep and three million people, my friend knew sheep.

One image that the gospel might subtly conjure up is that of a flock of dumb animals who mindlessly follow after whoever herds them. What my friend was (rightly) objecting to was the implication that the disciples of Jesus are basically dumb sheep, easily let by deception. But *is* the gospel implying this? The metaphor falters when we notice that it emphasizes the intimate knowledge the sheep have of the shepherd and vice versa (10:14). In the vocabulary of the Bible, “to know” another oftentimes refers to sexual intimacy. Moreover, the intimacy between Jesus and “his own” reflects the relationship he has with the Father (10:15) It is an intimacy that is expressed ultimately in loving self-surrender, even unto death.

There is a kind of domino effect in the Gospel of John. First, God pours out the divine self in love through the gift of the Word made flesh (1:14, 3:16), a self-surrender that is replicated in Jesus’s gift of self for those who are his own (10:15). This same action is what is asked of his followers, most especially those in leadership (15:13). The image of shepherd is used a number of times in the Scriptures to characterize a leader of the people. God is depicted as the Shepherd of Israel (see Gen 49:24; Ps 23:1; 78:52-53). And it’s surely not accidental or irrelevant that Moses and David were both actual shepherds before each was called to lead the people of Israel.

When Israel’s leaders were not tending to the needs of the people, they were denounced for being absent and stupid shepherds, who scattered the flock (see 1 Kgs 22:17; Jer 10:21; Ezek 34:5-). By contrast, Jesus is the “model” (the Greek word here is *kalos*, meaning “good,” “beautiful,” “exemplary”) shepherd, who gathers all together into one, giving his very life for his own. We replicate this kind of shepherding not by actively seeking suffering but by putting love at the center: God’s love made visible in Jesus, Jesus’s love made manifest in us. It is a love that is freely chosen by an empowered self, with a willingness to go to the depths of calamity if necessary. This requires not blind following but intimate knowledge of the model Shepherd and the free choice to continue his work of gathering all the disparate into one.

Today is a good day to ask ourselves: How does intimacy with Christ, the Good Shepherd empower me to replicate his loving self-surrender for those who are “his own”? What image in my own culture conveys what shepherds did in Jesus’s culture? Spending some time in prayer with *that* image might be a creative and fruitful way of reflecting on this gospel reading.

IMITATE THE GOOD SHEPHERD

In today’s Gospel reading, John 10: 11-18, we hear the beautiful words of Jesus describing himself as the Good Shepherd. He tells us that the Good Shepherd lays down his life for his sheep, showing the depth of his love and care for each one of us. The Good Shepherd has a personal knowledge of his sheep and lays down his life for them. He also provides divine security for his sheep.

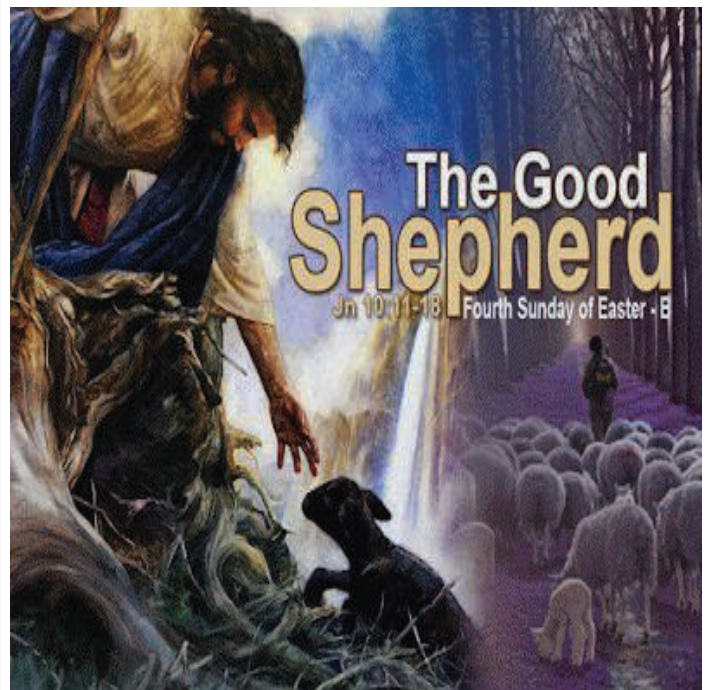
As followers of Christ, we are called to model ourselves after the Good Shepherd. We are called to love and care for one another, to lay down our lives in service to others. Just as Jesus sacrificed himself for us, we are called to sacrifice ourselves for those around us, especially those who are most in need.

But being a shepherd is not always easy. It requires patience, perseverance, and selflessness. It means putting the needs of others before our own, even when it is difficult or inconvenient. It means being willing to go to great lengths to protect and guide those in our care.

Jesus tells us that he knows his sheep, and they know him. As his followers, we too are called to know and be known by one another. We are called to form deep relationships built on trust, love, and mutual support. We are called to be a community that cares for and looks out for one another, just as the Good Shepherd cares for his flock.

Let us strive to be true shepherds in our own lives, following the example of Jesus, the Good Shepherd. Let us be willing to lay down our lives for one another, to know and be known by our brothers and sisters in Christ. And let us trust in the guidance and protection of the Good Shepherd, who leads us with love and compassion. Amen.

Daily Readings & Reflections

Monday, April 22, 2024 Easter Weekday

Acts 11:1-18; John 10:1-10

Saint Alphonse Ligouri described spiritual reading as the “reading of holy books [beyond scripture], not in a passing way and for a short time, but regularly and for a considerable time.” Eastertide seems an especially opportune time to invest yourself in the “mystery of faith.” Pope Francis’ latest book, *The Name of God Is Mercy*, is so stunning that it is often difficult to keep reading because the last sentence you read was so powerful. Don’t let the time after Easter slip by without investing yourself in the “mystery of faith.”



Tuesday, April 23, 2024 Easter Weekday Saint Aldabert, Bishop & Martyr

Acts 11:19-26; John 10:22-30

The pantheon of saints is filled with well-known and beloved figures, but little-heralded saints like Adalbert have their own stories as well. Born around 956, Adalbert came from a wealthy Czech family but chose to live a simple, even austere life of service. He had a keen sense of injustice,

protesting the slave trade long before most people even considered it an issue. He was installed twice as bishop of Prague but resigned, preferring the life of a hermit and missionary. When he was martyred at about age 40 far from home, it is said his body was ransomed by devoted Polish followers for its weight in gold. Do you live in such a way that your death would be so greatly observed?

Wednesday, April 24, 2024 Easter Weekday

Saint Fidelis of Sigmaringen

Acts 12:24–13:5a; John 12:44-50

Where would we be without light? Sunlight fills our sky by day and brings color to all that is around us. And electric light is such a central part of our evening activities it’s hard to imagine a world without it. It’s also hard to imagine a world without the light that Jesus brought through his life, mission, and timeless message. His illuminating words light a path we can walk day or night, at noon or at midnight. How important is the light of faith? The Bible seems to take it seriously. Pull up a chair and shed some light on the subject.



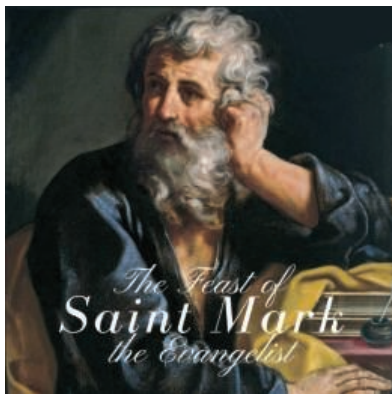
Thursday, April 25, 2024

The Feast of Saint Mark the Evangelist

1 Peter 5:5b-14; Mark 16:15-20

Tradition had it that lions slept with their eyes open (perhaps because no one was able to sneak up on one without being detected!). The lion became a symbol of the Resurrection, conveying the sense that though Jesus died he slept lightly, so to

speak, before awakening to eternal life. Mark the evangelist, the traditional author of the gospel that bears his name, is also often depicted as a lion. Pull up a chair and read the gospel that bears Mark’s name—it’s short enough to be read in its entirety in an afternoon. And it’s a real eye-opener!



Friday, April 26, 2024 Easter Weekday

Acts 13:26-33; John 14:1-6

The apostles didn’t know who they were destined to be when they began to follow Jesus. The same could be said of all of us who start down the path of faith with faltering and uncertain steps. Maybe someday we’ll be part of the canon of saints like Thomas, who up to the Last Supper was still asking Jesus where this road was headed. Obviously it had yet to occur to him that he would be one of the 12 founders of our apostolic tradition. Nor can we imagine who we might become if we continue on this way.

Saturday, April 27, 2024 Easter Weekday

Acts 13:44-52; John 14:7-14

Have you ever had the experience of looking everywhere for something, like a set of keys, only to find it tucked in your pocket? Sometimes that set of keys can be a bigger thing, like the job you were meant for or that special someone. Your relationship with God can sometimes go this way. You might not feel all that connected with God, or wonder when if ever God is going to show up, especially if you are going through a tough chapter in your life. While the location of your keys might be unpredictable (check the fridge!) the location of God never is. God is right there with you tucked within your heart and in your encounters each and every day.


